




Can cry or have tantrum

Autism Spectrum Disorder

Autism - being different

Spectrum – like a rainbow of colours

Disorder - unpredictable, chaos behaviour




Being different is pretty cool - be different and make friends with autism!

Jack and Tom are friends

Can you spot the difference?



Jack has blonde hair and blue eyes Tom has blonde hair and brown eyes and Autism - but that is hard to see



Means that he was born different - it doesn't mean he is sick or he will be fixed - it means that he will do things in a different way

Jack's brain is connected with many wires. Tom's, not so many That makes it harder for Tom to do some things like listen, look and talk all at the same time



Jack and Tom are friends and know each other well Knowing others makes it easier to understand them Like Jack knows that when Tom gets upset is because he struggles to say what he means and often people cannot understand what he wants



He uses these little picture cards to point at what he wants

Choose a friend and try to ask him/her for something without using words - you can use hands, face expressions, make funny noises, point at things, draw pictures or write

This may be fun to start with - it's not so nice

This may be fun to start with – it's not so nice when you don't have a picture for everything you want or cannot share how you feel.

What it means to be different?

If we were all the same it would be so boring

Difference means that we are all good at something else

For instance Kate is a good dancer, Jack can do tricks on his bike and Tom is good at climbing



Even people with autism are different from each other

What it means to have Special Needs?

I need a new Play station – but I can live without it!

Tom needs help with the toilet and eating – when I can do it myself

He also needs someone like Teaching Assistant to translate/talk for him – I can talk all on my own Having Autism, makes it hard for Tom to talk, not being able to talk makes it harder to make friends. Even when Tom likes someone he may not say so, but he may smile and follow you around to show that he likes you.



What can you do to have a special friend?

Use the universal language – **smile!** Jack says that Tom's first language is 'show me'

That means he has to show him what they are going to do next – instead of just saying it.
